THE SIEGE OF TOBRUK PART 9.

Lifein Tobruk went on with the usual question on everyones lips _"when the Hell are we going to get out of here." The Anti British Pro German Irishmen William Joyce, known by the Allies as Lord Haw Haw broadcast daily his propog anda from Berlin, his broadcast to Tobruk told us as we did not have any planes the Germans would send plenty over towns. He also said that as we spent so much of our time in holes in the ground like rats that we like rats would be exterminated. & that in future we would be known as "the rats of Tobruk" a name that stuck the world over to the end of the siege & after. When the Allies occupied Berlin in 1945 William Joyce was arrested & eventually executed for War Crimes. (THE RAT EXTERMINATED). We must have been surrounded for about 3 months when I had what I suppose was my greatest day of the War. I had got rid of the ridiculous Fiat Machine Gun, & now was the proud owner of a superb Besa Machine Gun which the 3 of us had removed one dark moonless night from a knocked out British heavy tank not a 100 meters from a forward German post, we could actually hear The Afrika Korps soldiers talking while we removed the gun. I think the Besa was the best MG of the War. The Hospital was always in urgent need of morphiz for the badly wounded, some with missing limbs & having to wait a long time in agony before surgery of sorts. in our workshop we often had a c ouple of tanks that we could put back into action except for a spare part or two we did not have & would have to wait maybe a couple of weeks or more for the next sea convoy to reach us. Could the urgent morphia & spares be sent by air?, Tobruk was in range of our bombers, but any bomber in the vicinity of Tobruk would be shot down in no time. Fast Fighter Planes might manage a quick in & out dropping by small parachute but they just did not have the range even from our most forward Desert aerodromes in Egypt, but H.Q., solved the problem by fitting 2 Spitfires with 2 extra disposable petrol tanks each which would be used first & then dropped into the sea. The idea was for these fast (in those days) fighters to take off from the aerodrome & fly straight out to sea for a couple of miles always flying just above the waves to avoid German radar then turn sharp left (east) until opposite Tobruk

turn south & come in over the low sand & scrub hills which lay between our workshops & the coast, drop our spares within a few metres of the workshop, turn sharp right for the 2 or 3 miles to the hospital, dropping the morphia paraschutes still flying fast & low, right again & over the hills over the sea & home. Well, it worked like a dream the planes were only over Tobruk for less than 5 minutes, & at 3.30p.m. the best time when the Luftwaffe pilots enjoyed siesta before hammering us with the usual sumdowner raids. I do not think the Germans ever knew of the Spitfires visit, this now became a regular feature every few weeks always with success.


Geordie ofcourse had to be my No. 2. on the new Besa. First we tidded up the gun pit, new sand bags all around the walls, & we dug a couple of recesses to take the ammo boxes, I had mentioned before we had no shortage of Ammouk in Tobruk, pity the same could not be said for water & food. The Besa is a belt fed M. G. & we had boxes of ordinary, tracer, & armour piercing, but neither of us new the correct way to load a belt so we settled for 5 tracer, 10 ordinary & 10 armour piercing 5 tracer & so on, not that it mattered as I was damn sure we would never hit an enemy plane, only the Stukas dived low & they were mostly over the harbour area, but on the few occasions we fired the Besa it was a good feeling to be hitting back in some way, & perhaps we helped to keep the Luftwaffe at altitude which meant less accuracy.

Every day or so we check the Besa by firing a few shots about mid:afternoon. This is just what we were doing one afternoon. I had the Besa pointed over the sand hills above the beach & looking through the telescopic sights when to my surprise I saw 2 fighters coming in low over the hills & heading towards us. I shouted to Geordie " it is the 3 Spitfires with our spares give them a wave", I am not guite sure what happened next, when about 400 metres away the planes suddenly turned right & to my horror the markings were not R.A.F. rondels but German crosses, these were Messerschmitts. I had the one plane in my sights & I think I got such a surprise that I must have pressed the trigger & kept it pressed because just about the whole tail plane disintergated and the plane took a nose dive, when it was about 200 feet above the ground the Aussie Ack Ack gunners opened up with their machine guns & the plane exploded. I remembered Geordie saying somethinglike "You shot the bloody thing down".

So both our workshops & the Aussies were credited with half a Messerschmitt each, much to Geordie's annoyance who reckoned we should have had a full credit, any way knocking the tail off was more luck than anything else. Our Colonel was thrilled & we were heros for a couple of days. As you can imagine that night around our hurricane lamp the 3 of us & Geordie made quite a hole in the Stuka Juice Demi-John.

It must have been in the first few months of the siege that some Aussies discovered in the bombed town a bomb happy printing press and office which must have been the home of Tobruk's daily newspaper before the War. Some Ex newspaper men serving with the Aussies managed to dig out one printing press machine & astually managed to get it working, they also discovered a very limited amount of suitable news print. These Aussies decided it might be possible to produce a newspaper in the siege Tobruk, that is just what these characters by hard work & determination managed to do. With so little paper it could only be one page (both sides) & only about 6 copies to each unit which had to be passed around to each man. & was produced once a month. The little newspaper was called "The Dinkum Oil" (Australian For True News), which it was & kept us posted with good & bad news. There will be very few copies of "The Dinkum Dil" in the world today, maybe a few in Australia. & I think Warriors Gate (The M.O.T.H.S. museam in Durban) has one copy. I wish now I had kept a copy as it would be a Collectors Item.
